OPIOID DISPOSAL TOOLKIT

PRESCRIPTION OPIOID DISPOSAL ADVOCACY

- Help your patients <u>locate their nearest opioid</u> <u>disposal bin</u>
- Advocate for a secure opioid disposal bin to be installed in your hospital/pharmacy
- Host an Opioid Takeback Event
 - Contact <u>Michigan OPEN</u> to learn how to host an opioid takeback event in your community
- If above options unavailable, instruct patients to flush excess opioids down toilet
 - Note that EPA recommends minimizing this strategy as it can impact local water supplies
- Leftover opioids can be mixed with cat litter/coffee or another undesirable substance and place in trash

What is Naloxone (Narcan®)?

- Naloxone reverses the effects of opioids, such as fentanyl
- Works almost immediately and is easy to administer
- Typical form: nasal sprays, such as Narcan®


How to Administer Naloxone (Narcan®)

(1) If you suspect an overdose, first call 911.

Nozzle

Plunger

- Lay the person on their back. Try to wake them up by yelling.
 - If no response, administer **Naloxone**, a life-saving medication, immediately.
 - Tilt the person's head back and hold Naloxone in the correct position
 - Place the nozzle into one nostril. Press down on the plunger firmly.

RECOGNIZE THE SIGNS OF AN OPIOID OVERDOSE

- Blue or grayish skin, lips, or nails
- For those with darker skin tone, grayish or blue skin may be difficult to identify. Lips or nail bed discoloration may be easier to identify such color changes
- Choking, snoring or gurgling sounds, or vomiting
- Unresponsive to shouting or firmly rubbing chest
- Pinpoint pupils (center part of eye is very small)
- Slow, irregular, or stopped breathing
- Slow heartbeat or low blood pressure
- Pale, clammy skin
